ABSENTEE RATE hit the PBGV classes at Boston where Peter Marks had 6 missing from the 19 entered. Noticeably these were all in bitches so doubtless seasons had something to do with it, either that or owners succumbing to the various evil germs going the rounds. From Junior, BD went to Ceri McEwan's Marunnel Orinoco, with RBD the Open winner Marion Hunt's Soletrader Buzz Aldrin of Bondlea. With RBB going to Phil & Dianne Reid's Fox's Nightmare Jessica Biel at Maudaxi (imp Rus), BB and BOB went to Paul Osbourne's Braego Gladys Aylward ShCM. At 11mths old, Tim & Deborah Bartley's Erylan Zeus Roi des Dieu went BP. In Gothenburg the largest Nordic dog show, MyDog Sweden, took place the same weekend. On day one at the National show with Nordic CACs, from Denmark BOB went to Gitte Winter Arildsen's Fodnote Be My Guest (Fanta's Brand Nobody Does It Better ex Fodnote Hot Shot) who was in the equivalent of our Yearling class, with BOS going to Agneta Kallén's Around Don't Be A Chicken (Ch Soletrader Magic Mike ex Around Snack Attack). There were 11 entered and the judge was Elina Haapaniemi (Fin). The following day at the International show, where CACIBs were on offer, with the same dogs, the results were reversed with Margaret O'Gorman (Irl) awarding BOB to Around Don't Be A Chicken, BOS to Fodnote Be My Guest, handled once again by Holger Busk. Agneta Kallén's Surround Da Capo (Around Another Bad Hair Day ex Surround Bossanova) went BP on both days. MANCHESTER, which has become an extra CC show on the PBGV calendar, drew an entry of 30 less 4 for Gavin Robertson who last gave CCs in the breed at WKC in 2009. One of those marked absent was our young dog who annoyingly decided to develop a limp on the day. The show vet attended quickly and, with nothing stuck in his pad, opinion was that he had somehow bruised his metatarsals. However an injection of Metacam didn't kick in sufficiently in time to save the day so he never set paw in the ring. Today, of course, as I write these notes, he is charging around the garden as though nothing had happened. The benching area was snug to say the least with exhibitors having difficulty moving around. A pole in the middle of the ring did little to help the view for judge or spectators and the ring was appreciably smaller than those in the main building, so it did seem improvements could be made. That said, the benching was near the rings and I even managed to move the car close to the building so it wasn't all bad. Both RCCs went to Linda Lewis handling her Tangaer Erique (Nykarth Okie Dokie at Tangaer ex Ch Debucher Sybelle at Callydena), who came 2nd in PD, and Kath Bamford's Tangaer Amour winner of OB (Debucher Quel Chance at Tangaer ex Putjade Utterley Butterley). CCs went to the PD and BP winner, Freer's Switherland Aldia Casanova (Ch Soletrader Magic Mike ex Irina Podkoldernik Jadowity) handled by Marita Rodgers and Lynne Scott's Overbecks Kathy Tiere (Ch Taglines Double the Fun for Soletrader ex Soletrader Ain't Actin Up at Overbecks ShCM) who also went BOB. BV was Paul Osbourne's Ch Nykarth's Kicking Off with Braego ShCM (Ch/Am Ch Gebeba Texas True Grit ex Nykarth Irresistable, the only veteran entered. FIRST OF ALL I must apologise for the late posting of last week's breed notes. I was without internet for several days so although written I was unable to upload them. Living without internet is difficult if not nigh on impossible nowadays! I seem to be going through a bad patch all round though as, early yesterday evening, a control knob and the spring behind it popped off my oven while it was on and I spent ages trying to turn it off, without much success. It was getting hotter and hotter in the kitchen and conservatory. I went to open the conservatory door to let some of the heat out, only to find it was already open! As the room fugged up alarmingly and the smell of burning increased, the PBGVs stood looking bewildered so I shooed them further away as I began to wonder whether it could catch fire. I think my son-in-law sensed the urgency in my voice when I phoned for help and, after finding the hidden oven point for switching off the electricity and spending maybe 15mins trying to turn what was left of the knob, he thankfully succeeded. With a replacement knob on order I now find that, as with maintenance of cars, gone are the days where oven cleaning was a simple business of being able to remove parts, clean and replace them. That said, the shock of what happened yesterday evening has goaded me into

action to do some early spring cleaning! I am often asked about missing critiques. Every year, when several months have elapsed after a show, if there has been no critique published, I contact the KC and they take up the matter. It is a shame this has to be done when part of a judge's contract is to supply a critique but last year I asked the KC to look into the non-appearance of nine PBGV and GBGV championship show ones. To date four are still outstanding. As you all know, one of these is for PBGVs at Crufts last year. This was going to the KC Shows Executive Committee for a decision on a penalty, which will appear in the Kennel Journal, so I will update you in due course. Of course, the majority of judges take their appointments seriously and I'd like to quote to you a comment I received from one such person yesterday, which I am sure he won't mind me putting in print here. "A critique takes no more than a couple of hours of your time and provides pleasure, reassurance and gives the exhibitor the answers they are looking for. I cannot understand how some judges do not feel that is important. As a non-specialist judge it's important to remember that the exhibitor has far more knowledge about their breed than you do. There is no greater compliment in this hobby than someone paying for your opinion of their dogs. There is no greater insult to the exhibitor than not sharing that opinion and explaining why you made those decisions. If you can't explain, then how can your opinion be worth seeking ever again". As the "last man standing" Our Dogs provides a good facility for club secretaries to check on old critiques or whether critiques have indeed been published at all. However, publication of any critique is slowed down by the volume of reports Our Dogs receives at any one time, also with restrictions on the size of weekly newspaper printed. At the height of the dog showing season they get swamped with over 500 critiques weekly. Reports do not go on their website straight away, they are only uploaded once the staff have dealt with them. This doesn't help the exhibitor who is waiting impatiently, keen to see what the judge thought of his/her dog and getting more frustrated as the weeks pass and no critique. Of course, now the Kennel Club has provided the facility for judges to upload their critiques straight awayhttps://kcjudgescritiques.org.uk/ with their website sporting a photo of Ceri McEwan judging a Fauve on the home page. We had a good example of swift uploading last year where Mark Cocozza posted his "warts and all" PBGV critique the same day as judging at Three Counties; and you will find that Gavin Robertson uploaded his critique shortly after Hound day at Manchester last week. This is a refreshing change for exhibitors, though someone did make the comment that posting critiques too swiftly allows the Group judge to view results and the judge's view of the BOB. This is a valid comment however, I would imagine, highly unlikely and no more likely than a conversation in the Judges' Room. Nearly the end of January and the days are getting a little longer though some of you have weathered snow this week. Please bear in mind that, if your annual subscription is unpaid by the end of this month, you will be ineligible to receive voting papers should there be any ballot before the AGM. That said, the PBGV entries are dropping year on year with only 9 this year, just one more than GBGVs who only recently made their first appearance at the show. This surely must be an all time low as there were 14 last year. Other than experiencing the show itself, with such poor entry I can't imagine why anyone would want to travel a long way to sit ringside and watch. Monday 11 February is the day when PBGVs are being shown and I will look forward to viewing on my computer. As I write this, the weather isn't too rosy in parts of the UK either, so I hope anyone who is snowbound is stocked up with food for humans and dogs. Coincidentally, following on from my comments about missing critiques in my last week's notes, yesterday someone posted on facebook that, since Boston 2018, 367 championship show critiques had not been published. These, of course, include those missing from PBGVs. With the full list appearing in print, sadly the same judges' names crop up time and again. It is therefore incredulous that the KC fails to act but, no, they pass the same miscreants for other breeds and other shows time and again. weird and wonderful world of the Judges Competency Framework, today I emailed or wrote to all judges on our C lists. Anyone currently on a C list will need to be registered at JCF Level 1 or above, or be on a breed club B list, to judge that breed from 1 January 2020 onwards. With the jaws of the JCF crocodile snapping from below, any C list judge should clamber up as soon as possible onto the B list as the clock inside the crocodile is ticking away and, before you know it, you will be sunk without trace. On the B list and it will give enough breathing space to carry on judging from the BGV Club's list while the next scramble takes place to achieve Level 2 under the new JCF requirements. If you didn't receive an email from me or don't get a letter within the next couple of day, let me know. THE YEARS ROLL BY and all things must change. The French saying "Chasse d'abord" rings true for our hunting breed and, in our PBGV book, Valerie Link and I wrote about prominent packs of the time. Here, in the mid-70s, an ardent Nick Valentine, embarked on a lifetime of hunting with PBGVs. By the mid '90s he had set up his Bradley Vale kennels. He moved several times, finally settling at Ryeford, near Ross-on-Wye, with his pack name aptly changed to the Ryeford Chase. Over the years, I am sure Nick will not mind if I say that the hounds did not remain pure PBGV. They were a joy to watch and his mastery of them skillful. In 1999 he celebrated 25 years so it was hardly surprising to learn twenty years later he had finally, reluctantly decided to hang up his hunting horn as, with age, looking after and exercising so many dogs was not an easy task. I understand that many, if not all, went to Ireland. And in America, on 27 January Jim Scharnberg of the Skycastle French Hounds in Malvern, PA, passed away having valiantly fought cancer for several years. Jim became involved with the hounds in 1987 on the death of Elizabeth Streeter. She had first started the pack with English hunting Bassets in 1948, then became attracted to PBGVs and imported from England in 1975 before going to France and importing more from there. When she died, the private pack was renamed the Skycastle French Hounds and, over the years, Jim continued the tradition of importing PBGVs from France. With this regular infusion of French blood, the hounds showed their prowess both in hunting and conformation. BOB: Young dog, full of quality, has all the decired features for the breed s.a. short forface, short back, short ears and tail, exc. coat, correct angulation front and rear, exc,topline, perfectly handled, super temperament, he is going to be very succesfull in future. BP: Lovely puppe, correst proportions, nice coat, well angulated, mowes well, exc. temperament. BB: Very feminine bitch, fits weill into the breed standard, sweet face, exc. coat, correct tail, exc,topline, perfectly handled, super temperament, RBD: Exc. dog, very correct in proportions, correct coat, short ears and tail, sound mower, exc,topline, mowed well, nice temperament RBB: feminine bitch, typical PGV, correct coat, short ears and tail, exc. topline, well angulated, mowed well, nice temperament. Per C Knudsen With just four weeks to go to this year's Crufts, entries have been published. First in Ring 31 there are 77/80 PBGVs for Yours Truly, followed by 33/34 GBGVs for Graham Hill.

AFTER 11MTHS OF WAITING, the publication on the Club facebook page and in my breed notes last week of the notes on nameless main winners for last year's Crufts resulted in a predictably negative reaction. In fact, quite a few were angry. This is hardly surprising as UK exhibitors, who pay a lot to enter, do expect to see what the judge thought of their dogs. And the Crufts judging contract makes it clear that it is a condition of accepting the

appointment that a critique on the first and second in each class is submitted to the dog press within one month of the appointment. Of course there is a little more to this incident than meets the eye but I do think possibly the KC should not have pressed for even an abbreviated critique. At this late stage this only served to make matters worse. On a brighter note, the KC has now succeeded in getting the WKC 2018 critiques for both breeds in print, also PBGVs City of Birmingham. At Westminster, with 3 absent from the 9 entered, BOB went to Donna Moore & Janice Hayes' GCHB AM CH M&M's Calamity Jane (AM CH Auriga's Just Jack ex GCH M&M's Texas Mae West), handled by Janice; Best Opposite Sex was Cindy & Gary Wood's GCHB AM CH Talus Stonehouse I'm A Travelin' Man; Select Dog Shelley Barclay & Mona Stiles' GCHB AM CH Tetu's Mister Homer; Select Bitch Jan Zigich & Ross Litman's GCH AM CH Mirepoix's Kate Spade; Award of Merit Lynne & Mark Florian and Jeanne & Charles Hurty's GCH AM CH CJ's Rollin' On Five Mile River. The judge was Michael Canalizo. Calamity Jane made it to the final eight in the Hound Group judged by Pat Craige Trotter. Yet again there has been a shortage of Latanoprost. This must be a constant worry for those who have PBGVs affected with POAG who count on a regular supply. I gather it is now back in stock again but, with one supplier, the price has more than trebled. I am thinking the way forward might be to list suppliers on the club website to help those needing either Latanoprost or Xalatan. Email me if you would like to help.

AS LAST YEAR, it has now been announced there is a delayed start of 10am for judging in Hall 5, ring 31. So PBGV exhibitors now have an extra hour to get to the NEC, or to wait - whichever way you look at it. I gather entries for the club open show on 6 April are starting to trickle in. With the closing date of 16 March, I am sure many are putting this task on the back burner until Crufts is out of the way but it was one job I wanted to get done and forget about. Of course, there are few shows nowadays where completing a paper entry is called for and it certainly makes you think when having to enter date of birth, names of sire and dam and so on. Hopefully though the errors that cropped up in the Club championship show catalogue such as incorrect details for address will be avoided when exhibitors are forced to put pen to paper. So, if you think one week after Crufts is cutting it a bit fine for entering, do it now! At the time of writing, the Discover Dogs tickets have yet to arrive. Another "cutting it fine" exercise, especially for Lynn Wood who has to send out tickets for two breeds, not one. Sixteen sessions. Envelope are ready but where are the tickets? And then we have to put our faith in a speedy postal service where it seems it makes little difference whether you use a first class or second class stamp these days. Following on from my notes about the Latanoprost shortage Linda Lewis has let me know about someone who has an 8yr old PBGV that is on Latanoprost and Cosopt. The dosage for some time was 1 drop of Latanoprost daily in each eye and the same dosage and frequency for Cosopt. He was in obvious pain with pressures over 30. The vet suggested upping the dose but the PBGV became worse. With an observant, vigilant and caring owner who knew her dog, the decision was instinctively to lower the dose. The PBGV is now on 1 drop of Latanaprost in each eye once every evening and alternate evenings, 1 drop of Cosopt in each eye. His pressures were tested soon after altering the doses and amazingly they had decreased to 20 and 24, the lowest they had been for over a year. He was happier, could see more and is no longer rubbing his eyes. The moral of the story is that sometimes less is more. Sometimes vets generalise and fail to treat each animal as an individual. Remember we spend so much time with our PBGVs, we undoubtedly know them far better than the vets.

PREPARATIONS ARE UNDER WAY FOR CRUFTS especially by overseas exhibitors who have to pack their cars for a long drive and think about what documentation they will need, not only for themselves but for their dogs. This is the last Crufts we will all experience before Britain leaves the EU in some shape or form on 29 March. Although the Government remains committed to achieving a deal with the EU there is, of course, the possibility they will not reach an agreement. Like many government departments, DEFRA has had to plan for every eventuality. Interestingly it seems there will be no change to the current requirements for dogs entering the UK from the EU after 29 March. However for anyone here wanting to travel or exhibit in the EU after 29 March, you should contact your vet at least 4 months before travelling to get the latest advice. As things stand at the moment the following may help. Rules for Dog Travel The rules for taking your dog to any EU country will change if the UK leaves the EU with no deal and is treated as an unlisted country. You must get your microchipped dog vaccinated against rabies before it can travel. However, to allow effective contingency planning in the worst-case scenario of the UK not being granted third country status, you'll need to take the following steps to make sure your pet can travel after 29 March 2019: You must get your microchipped dog vaccinated against rabies before it can travel. Your dog must have a blood sample taken at least 30 days after the rabies vaccination. You'll need to talk to your vet about whether you need a rabies vaccination or booster before this test. Your vet must send the blood sample to an EU-approved blood testing laboratory. The results of the blood test must show that the vaccination was successful – that is your dog must have a rabies antibody level of at least 0.5 IU/ml. You must wait 3 months from the date the successful blood sample was taken before you travel. You must take your pet to a Official Veterinarian (OV), no more than 10 days before travel to get a health certificate. And remember, if there's no deal, pet passports issued in the UK would not be valid for travel to the EU. A successful blood test is only required for first time travel to an EU country. This is provided that your dog's rabies vaccinations are kept up to date with boosters before the expiry date of the previous vaccination. Your dog's health certificate would be valid for: 10 days after the date of issue for entry into the EU; 4 months of onward travel within the EU; re-entry to the UK for 4 months after the date of issue. On arrival in the EU, dog owners travelling with their pets would be required to enter through a designated Travellers' Point of Entry (TPE). At the TPE, the dog owner may be asked to present proof of microchip, rabies vaccination and the blood test result alongside their dog's health certificate. Repeat trips to the EU Dogs that have previously had a blood test and have an up-to-date rabies vaccination do not need to repeat the blood test. Your dog will need a health certificate for each trip to the EU. To get a new health certificate you must take your dog to an OV no more than 10 days before you travel. You must take proof of: your dog's vaccination history; a successful rabies antibody blood test result. Return to the UK Your dog must have one of the following documents when returning to the UK: an existing EU pet passport (both for UK and EU citizens); the EU health certificate issued in the UK used to travel to the EU; a UK pet health certificate (issued outside the UK for travel into the UK only) Check the routes before you travel. On existing approved routes your documents and microchip will be checked. If you are not travelling on an approved route talk to your vet about what preparations you need to make before travel. Of course there are other situations that may need clarification, so for more information go to www.gov.uk/guidance/pet-travel-toeurope-after-brexit. A couple of deadlines coming up are that entries for our Club open show close on Saturday 16 March. If you have a young puppy, enter the Baby Puppy walk which is bound to be good fun for everyone, not least the pups who will love socialising. Another closer deadline is on the day of Crufts, by which date proposed and seconded items for the Club's AGM agenda should reach me by post to Sharnden, Fourth Avenue, Stanfordle-Hope, Essex SS17 8HN. Last year before the AGM I posted information about how we intended to carry out the ballot for club show judges, this in view of the evolving changes taking place for the Judges Competency Framework. This year is no different so here is information on how the ballot for judges will be carried out this year: JUDGES NOMINATIONS 2019 FOR OPEN SHOW 2021 AND CHAMPIONSHIP SHOW 2022 Before last year's AGM the Judges Sub-Committee reviewed procedures and trialled a different method of selection of judges. In addition, in view of the uncertainties surrounding contracting of UK judges during the implementation phase of the Judges Competency Framework, a decision was made to select overseas judges for our 2021 championship show. As has always been done, a shortlist of names for the open show 2020 was produced by the Judges Sub-Committee to be voted on and results were announced at the AGM. While this worked well, with the Judges Competency Framework still evolving the Judges Sub-Committee undertook to continue reviewing procedures. The move not to contact every A and B list judge beforehand for availability is a sound one. This cuts out one stage in the selection process where in the past judges' expectations have been raised unnecessarily when many didn't make the short-list. It also avoided the exorbitant costs of a full member postal ballot where the majority of ballot papers were not returned. The next stage has remained as it always has, where the JSC are best placed to decide who would potentially draw a better entry for the Club and pass the recommended short-list on for the ballot. Last year we vested the final decision from the short-list in the committee. To move this forward and again involve members, this year the final vote will be made by those present at the AGM.

FOR THOSE OF YOU GOING TO CRUFTS who have yet to have your PBGV DNA tested, this is a golden opportunity to get a 20% reduction on the usual price of £48 for the duration of the show. The Animal Health Trust genetics research teams will be there in Hall 3, Stand 55 to answer any questions and talk about their work. If you receive the quarterly Kennel Club Breed Records Supplement you may have noticed that DNA testing results have recently been mixed with results of eye testing. These are sent to the KC by an eye panel ophthalmologist. The explanation is that there was a systems error. The KC accepts that the DNA tests and eye tests should be clearly separated and this will be corrected for future supplements. A gremlin also crept into the Winter 2018 edition declaring that PBGVs were currently certified for GPRA (Progressive Retinal Atrophy). The only condition we have listed under Schedule A is Primary Open Angle Glaucoma, with Persistent Pupillary Membrane listed under Schedule B. The KC has explained that there are currently restrictions on the system meaning that some details are input manually, hence the error. However I have been assured that, once the KC's new computer system is launched around July/August, errors like this should be prevented. In the lead up to Crufts, quite a few of you were out and about last weekend at open shows. At Wath, West Melton & DCS Paul Osbourne's Ch Debucher Jezebel at Braego ShCM went BV in Group, and at East of Scotland Canine Club Claire Gilluley's Haliston Didier ShCM won Hound Group 1 having gone through from AVNSC Hound. The judge was David Robson (Robricci). We are now nearing the closing date of Saturday 16 March for entries for our BGV Club open show. SOME WEEKS there is little to write for breed notes, others the cup runneth over. The notes following our AGM and Open Show atWeedon Bec in Northamptonshire are one such week.

Fiona Buchanan (Tarmachan) was our PBGV judge with a rather high absentee rate of 9 from her entry of 27. She awarded Best Dog to Phil & Dianne Reid's Maudaxi Nick Nack (Ch Maudaxi Jimmy Choo ex Trezeguet Treacle Sponge at Maudaxi) with Reserve going to our Beaujons Vagabond of Monkhams (Ger/Pol/Fin/Dk/Int Ch Petit Heroes Canned Heat ex Beaujons Tickled Pink ShCM). Best Bitch and ultimately BOB went to Paul Osbourne's Braego Gladys Aylward ShCM (Ch Nykarth's Kicking off with Braego ShCM ex Ch Debucher Jezebel at Braego ShCM) with Phil & Dianne Reid's Fox's Nightmare Zeta Jones (imp Rissa) (Maudaxi Jimmy Choo ex Fox's Nightmare Euro Show Non-Stop) standing in reserve. Our Monkhams Memphis Belle (Beaujons Vagabond of Monkhams ex Monkhams Luna Luvgood) was Best Puppy and her granny, Steve & Lynn Wood's 9yr old Beaujons Tickled Pink ShCM (Ch Gemshorn Rocky ex Monkhams Dorothy Perkins) Best Veteran. In the final competition against the Grands, Gladys went Reserve Best in Show to Colin and Ann Makey's Ch/Bel Ch Gairside Good Lord JW ShCM and also took Best Opposite Sex in Show over their Ch/Bel Ch Gairside Good Gracious. PBGVs came reserve in the other competitions with Reserve BPIS going to our Memphis Belle (Bea) and Reserve BVIS to Lynn & Steve's Tickled Pink (Pinky).

Thanks go to our judges Sue Marshall, Fiona Buchanan and Judith Robin-Smith, also stewards Tina Parker and Chris Hill, and our photographer and, in Kim Culyer-Dawson's absence, matting delivery man Tim Jennings. Also during the day, the committee was hard at work with Geraldine Dodd and Kathy Moulding in charge of the raffle, which I gather raised a fabulous £105. As ever, cakes made and donated by Geraldine and Jan Bishop were much in demand and Claire Cooper had several helpers in the kitchen, including Jan Bishop, Lynn Wood, Paul Osbourne, Geraldine and Joan Robertson, who helped serve judges' and stewards' lunches. Baked potatoes were popular, with Peter Marks' renowned chilli as one of the fillings. In the morning the early birds got the worm with bacon rolls on offer, courtesy of Claire. Not unusually, over the years, those attending BGVC AGMs

have been predominantly breeders and exhibitors. Even when last year's AGM was a standalone event due to 40th anniversary celebrations, every member there had a connection with the show world. Therefore, although a return to holding the AGM this year on the same day as the Open Show dictated an early 9am start, this was in the knowledge that exhibitorscan rise early to get to a dog show and those with a vested interested would turn up for this obligatory annual event.

Admittedly rather dry affairs, AGMs are traditionally never particularly well attended and, to be honest, a low attendance does notnecessarily indicate apathy but rather a Club with satisfied members. I remember many years back going with Kim Culyer-Dawson to an AGM for another breed in which we are involved, only to find we were the only two members there. The committee sat with an array of trophies to award with no-one to receive them. And despite it being a numerically larger breed, AGM attendance still usually remains below 20. Looking back over the past five years at our own Club, attendance has been remarkably stable with around 8% of the membership: 30 in 2014, 43 in 2015, 32 in 2016, 37 in 2017, 21 last year and 35 this year. Although numbers attending vary a little each year, interestingly, taking into account fluctuations in membership, only a marginally higher percentage of the membership accounts for exhibitors.

Although no comments had been received beforehand, this year's decision to hold a judges ballot at the AGM met with some opposition on the day. A discussion followed where opposing views were expressed and various suggestions offered for the way forward in future years. One of which, electronic balloting, has been under review for some time now, a free version sourced and asmall trial carried out with a larger one planned in the near future. If we are to continue along similar lines with our selection of judges, the right to give every member a vote is naturally appreciated. However, as I wrote in my 1 March breed notes, when a full ballot is carried out, the majority of ballot slips remain unreturned. And, interestingly, the last time the Club did a full postal ballot, of the approx. 27% who returned ballot slips, assuming all exhibitors returned theirs, around 18% would have been unfamiliar with the judges' names. This in itself tells us something.

So, other than pulling a name out of our Chairman's cap, which way do we turn for ensuring the best possible judges for our Club shows? Historically it is accepted the Judges Sub-Committee is in a better position to ensure we place before the membershipthe best possible judges for our shows, ones likely to draw a decent entry. And for the past 20 years, this has been the case, with numbers being whittled down to present a final six for each breed on which to vote. Taking the needs of the Judges Competency Framework into consideration, the way forward is still under discussion and, as our Chairman Paul Osbourne said at the meeting, comments have been noted.

With the Club having been without a President since the death of Yvonne Dean, members present gave unanimous approval to the honoured acceptance by Professor Peter Bedford of becoming its next President. As an Honorary Member, Peter is regarded highly with his background within the breed of at least 23yrs of unswerving support, eye-testing PBGVs, pre-empting Primary Open Angle Glaucoma, advising treatment and continuous support for any afflicted PBGV. He continues post-DNA eye testing and is vigilant in detecting other eye concerns. Gavin Robertson was returned as Vice-President. There being no other nominations, Paul Osbourne retained his position as Chairman and committee members Claire Cooper, Geraldine Dodd and LynnWood retained theirs on the committee, with co-opted committee member Martin Bishop picking up his post as Membership Secretary.

She awarded BOB to GCHS HiCotton Can't Stop Rockin' with BOS to Tim & Vickie Willmann's Am Ch Mirepoix's Straight Up (Am Ch Nightdream Diego Delgado ex GCH Mirepoix's Pierre-Jouet). WD and BOW was Patricia Whitlock's Centerstage Sully (Am Ch McRudge Centerstage Fun Time In Rio at Morganmills ex Centerstage Starlit), WB Teri King's Centerstage Defying Gravity (Am Ch Charlen's Xcaliber ex Am Ch Charlen's Reign). BP was Tony Long, Michael Stewart & Tammy Hensley's Grand-Voile's Juicy Pear (GCH Sonora Hidalgo ex Am Ch Mirepoix's That's My Jam). BV Can't Stop Rockin'.

I HOPE YOU ALL HAD A GOOD EASTER. Plenty of open shows on, though I am thankful I didn't enter any as I was felled low for the entire Easter break by vile germs, so would not have been going anywhere. In fact, Jenna and her husband took on the task of getting four of our PBGVs' eyes tested at one of Peter Bedford's sessions in Essex. Although all except one of ours are POAG Clear, having lost a Carrier PBGV to unexplained acute bi-lateral POAG, I like to have the older ones eye tested every few years to ensure nothing else sinister is brewing, other than the expected problems associated with advancing years. It may be costly but gives peace of mind. A motley gang of various breeds congregated at South Woodham Ferrers, though there was quite a gathering to fly the PBGV flag and, for those that are clinically affected, Peter was pleased that all pressures are under control. Praise the Lord for Latanoprost. As usual, Weldricks seems to be the cheapest on-line pharmacy to go to with your prescription and, from all accounts, they are a most obliging and helpful company. However do keep an eye on price from week to week as, although cheaper than most, it seems to go up and down like a yoyo. One show we didn't go to was Dunstable & DCS where there was a change of judge for PBGVs with Elias Vorias going over the 6 entered. With 1 absent, he awarded BOB to Teresa Eaton's Linphil Kili, who went on to G4 under John Purnell (Yikasown). Dunstable had very short notice to find replacement judges for all the breeds that had been allocated to Liz Millward, who I gather had a very sick dog who tragically died around the time of the show, Of course we don't know the difficulties involved but it is a pity that Dunstable didn't use someone from our PBGV judging list as a replacement when there were a couple at the show. Traditionally attracting a larger entry at this first outdoor CC show of the year, there are 38 PBGVs entered for Rod Price at Birmingham National on 11 May. PBGVs are after Otterhounds and GBGVs and not before 11a

ALTHOUGH THERE ARE NO BREED CLASSES AT WELKS there was a good representation of Petits in the Not Separately Classified classes. Of the 17 actually present, seven were PBGVs. The judge was Tim Ball and he awarded Best NSC Hound to Robertson & Doherty's Ch Soletrader Magic Mike. Having gone RBIS there in 2017 and BIS last year, he had to settle for Hound Group 2 this time round under Jan Pain. This is one of the few championship shows where there is no competition for Best Puppy in Show, however they continued this year with awarding group placings for Special Beginners, newly introduced last year. In YKC Members Stakes judged by Mark Walshaw, it was a 4th for Charlotte Dalgarno with Vencharno Mojito. Elsewhere the shows in Scotland attracted some. At Drongan & DCS, Marion Sergent was the PBGV and Group judge. With just one class, she awarded BOB to Foote & McAulay's Erylan Hebe La Fille Jeune, also giving her top place in the Hound Group. The following day a back-to-back (Falkirk & DCS and LKA of Scotland) attracted a good turnout of Petits with an entry of 10. At both shows BOB went to Foote & McAulay's Ir Ch Clonallan Just Beginning Avec Erylan ShCM. And, Lorna & Steve Wyllie's Ch Tangaer Rhapsody at Callydena ShCM celebrated her tenth birthday in style by going Best Hound Veteran at the Falkirk show. Condolences to Lesley Cooper who has lost Jayanel A Rising Star (Ch Debucher Mioche ex Tangaer Janvier at Tanafei) at the age of 14. One of Star's wins was RBCC at Houndshow in 2009, a spectacular show for all the wrong reasons where it poured with rain so we were moved inside to a tiny, dingy ring, then judging was delayed when a lighting fixture exploded and shattered glass everywhere. And, in America, the death has been announced of Shirley Knipe. Shirley was a retired California teacher. Her greatest love was dogs. With Debbie Perrott, she founded Hootwire Kennel where they successfully bred, raised and trained German Shepherds, German Wirehaired Pointers, Bassets Griffons Vendéens and, latterly, Italian Spinonis with much success. In 1984 Barbara Galbraith imported Wakelyns Noblesse from Ann and Sandy McKenzie. Despite only having one litter when bred to another of Barbara's imports, Wakelyns Javelot, she produced Lacebarks Lydia, born 6 July 1988. Lydia went into joint ownership with Debbie Perrott and Shirley Knipe and she became one of the top winning, top producing bitches in the breed's history at that time and the foundation of many American kennels. Along with Debbie, Shirley was also one of the early people to import the GBGV into the States and was active as a member of GBGVCA Board of Directors for many years.

THE BANK HOLIDAY WEEKEND saw several shows taking place, notably those in Ireland, where the sun shone the whole weekend. Gavin Robertson was the judge at South Tipperary where he awarded Green Star Dog to Gilluley's Haliston Didier ShCM ShCEX. GSB/BOB went to Foote & McAulay's Erylan Hebe La Fille Jeune, whom he also awarded G4. The following day at Fermoy International Show B Zorab judged and once again Bilbo (Haliston Didier) gained GSD and, having gone BOB, Tilly went even better by going G2 under Ms E Caminade Lavault having gone BOB under N Zorab. This gave her her last point for her junior champion title. With 4-6mth old puppies allowed to enter under FCI rules, worthy of a mention is Mrs D Whitehouse's Knotdogs Zoe Winter Gift (Beaujons Vagabond of Monkhams ex Afterglow Minnie the Minx) who was the winner of Baby Puppy Bitch at both shows. Finishing the Irish mini circuit, at Hound Association of Ireland it was GSD once again for Bilbo which subject to IKC confirmation makes him an Ir Ch. GSB and BOB went to Erylan Aphrodite La Belle, who went on to G4. At Chelmsford & DCS Ann Makey judged PBGVs, awarding BOB to our Monkhams Luna Luvgood (Suton Crepu Visage Love From Roxy to Gemshorn (imp USA) ex Monkhams Kiwi JW ShCM), RBOB to Teresa Eaton's Linphil Kili (Ch Debucher Unique ex Tangaer Zibeline avec Linphil). Our Monkhams Memphis Belle went BP, then Hound PG1 under Geraldine Dodd and, carrying on the family tradition went RBPIS under Barry Blunden (Licassa). Three years ago her grandfather, Diana Sadler's William (Suton Crepu Visage Love From Roxy to Gemshorn) went BIS at this show and two years ago her mother won BPIS. And at this her first show, Jan and Martin Bishop's Jamar Ina The Countessa achieved a creditable 2nd place in a large AV Minor Puppy Stakes that had an entry of 32, also judged by Barry Blunden. The weather makes for an unpredictable show at Birmingham National this weekend. Hopefully it will have settled by then and improved in time for SKC the following weekend where there is an entry of 21/32 for Pam Marston-Pollock. May's lucky LOD winners are Martin & Ally Garside with £25, Ceri McEwan £12 and Paula Mobsby with £6. There has been a spate of deaths of well-known PBGVs in the States. One was Karen Clugston's BIS winner Am Ch Jaren's Our Girl Friday, another Multi Int Ch/Am Ch Mirepoix's Sid Vicious. He was diagnosed with a bladder stone a few weeks ago but ultrasound also showed he had prostate cancer which was fast growing, leaving Jan Zigich and Ross Litman with that most difficult decision of all. Sired by Am Ch Mirepoix's Cartoon Comedy out of Mirepoix's La Petit Ingenue, Sid is well known for the fantastic show career he had in Finland. He is notably the sire of Kristina Bergström's Multi Ch Nightdream Ricky Martin, who was bred by Sirkka Sundström. Jan has the consolation that he will live on through litters he sired and his grandchildren that are now around the world. Finally those of you who are Assured Breeders will have been contacted by the KC explaining that DEFRA has issued a note for local authorities in England in which it is made clear that any member of the Kennel Club Assured Breeder Scheme of at least three years' standing should be awarded a five-star breeding licence valid for three years. Following the earlier confusion, DEFRA has also provided clarification on the £1,000 trading income licensing exemption. They have made it clear that the "£1,000 trading income as referred to in the guidance documents should be used as an indicator and not a ceiling, as someone with over £1,000 trading income may not be a commercial dog breeder or pet seller and they may not be making a profit".

17 / 5 / 2019

THE WORLD DOG SHOW came and went this year with little effect over this side of the world. It took place in Shanghai, China, where there were just 4 PBGVs entered – 1 puppy bitch and 3 male champions - over the four days of shows. On 30 April, the first day the APAC (Asia Pacific) CH Show (CACIB) took place with PBGV judge Rafael Malo Alcrudo (ESP), also the Shanghai Winner (CACIB) with Gopi Krishnan (MYS); second day was the CKU INT (CACIB) show with Hans van den Berg the judge and Eastern China (CAC) judged by Oleg Yanchev (RUS). The 2/3 May were for the CH (CAC) show where Alex Zee (TWN) was the PBGV judge and the culmination of the exhibition saw Paul Stanton as the judge for the World Dog Show. Tina Romeis travelled from Germany to Shanghai with 6yr old Ger Ch Arthur vom Huzenlaub (Empereur du Parcs des Chaumes ex Daphne). She said there were WDS representatives at the airport to welcome everyone on arrival with a separate channel guaranteeing smooth and efficient quarantine control and bypassing entry queues. A shuttle bus took them to the hotel and there was bus transport for dogs from the hotel to the exhibition centre. Dog boxes went in the storage underneath, dogs on seats with their owners. Rings at the show were spacious, there was comfortable air conditioning and the halls were light. Ring stewards were knowledgeable and friendly with a very good command of English. Although, in total there were six shows (3 CAC, 3 CACIB including WDS) and some exhibitors entered all of them, Tina didn't. I can see why as the high entry fees made this a costly affair. At the China Kennel Union show Arthur won CACIB and BOB under breed judge Hans van den Berg (NL), then G4 under Group 6 judge Mr Alex Zee (TWN). And at the WDS it was another BOB, this time under Paul Stanton and another G4 from Satoshi Bessho (JPN). At Birmingham National Rod Price had four absent from his entry of 38. DCC (his third) & BOB went to Reid's Maudaxi Tommy Holedigger (Multi Ch/Am GCh Ch Soletrader Bjorn Borg ex Ir Ch Trezeguet Treacle Sp

Crunch v Tum-Tums Vriendjes ex Iparla Des Echos De Buzet), RBCC Blake & Reid's Ch Vilauddens Midsummer Madness (Imp Swe). BP was Scott's Soletrader Langham Rose for Overbecks, BV Brown's Ch Soletrader Louis Vuitton and Best Special Beginner Bartley's Erylan Loki Maitre Du Mal who was later short-listed in the Group. And, in the KC Breeders Competition Frank Kane awarded Reid's Maudaxis 3rd and Foote's Erylans 4th. In Scotland Debbie O'Brien was the hound judge at Perthshire Canine Club where Lorna & Steve Wyllie's Ailsa – Ch Tangaer Rhapsody at Callydena ShCM went BVIS. In the breed class, her granddaughter, Tangaer Calvera avec Callydena, went BOB and HG2. Hound group and BIS judge was Bill Gregory. The next championship show is Bath where there is an entry of 40 for Fred Ellingford, who is giving CCs for the first time. Racing through the month and only two weeks to go before the "Southern Day of the BGV", the BGVC fun day being held at Walberton Village Hall in West Sussex. The last time this was held there was in 2016 so I am sure it will be a popular return for South of England BGV owners and friends. Bring a picnic – there will be light refreshments available all day. For £5 your dog can enter all 10 fun classes, which will be judged by Jackie Hornby (Jacmist). There will also be various items for sale, including the ever-popular breed mugs, an Agility competition and Scenting demonstration. AT SKC Pam Marston-Pollock's entry of 20 was depleted by 2, also doubtless further reduced by a few who could not get to a Friday show. DCC & BOB went to Robertson & Doherty's Ch Soletrader Magic Mike, with RDCC to Reid's Maudaxi Nick Nack. Phil & Dianne Reid also picked up the BCC with Fox's Nightmare Zeta Jones at Maudaxi (imp Rus). BP and RBCC went to Lynne Scott's Soletrader Langham Rose for Overbecks and BV to the only veteran present O'Brien's Caldewriver Despicable Me. There were a few successes in other classes – Maudaxis coming 2nd in AV Hound Breeders Competition and O'Brien's Caldewriver Despicable me handled to second place in both the YKC Member Stakes Hound and Junior Handling Association 12-16yrs. Once again being fortunate with having good weather for their outdoor show, Wickford, Basildon & DCS saw David Bell (Balintyne) judging PBGVs and awarding BP and BOB to our Monkhams Memphis Belle who subsequently went PG4 under Sue Finnett (Hyndsight). Shows are coming thick and fast now and Amanda O'Day has eight PBGVs entered under her at the midweek Reading show, which uses Southern Counties Newbury Showground. On to Southern Counties and Leila Tarabad has an entry of 20. No CCs and another Friday show, though more central for many. Unfortunately, coming soon after Bath, for those living several hours drive from Newbury Showground, the logistics of two midweek shows make it impossible to attend. Losing CCs at Three Counties has unfortunately resulted in the entry plummeting for Michael MacLaren who has 5 this year, compared with the 31 last year. Again, with this being a weekday show, it doubtless affects numbers when there are no CCs. But first, we have Bath this weekend with 40 for Fred Ellingford, giving CCs for the first time – and, don't forget, for the first time Hounds have been moved to the Sunday of this bank holiday weekend. At this year's PBGVCA National in Kerrville, Texas, blood was drawn from 12 PBGVs and shipped to the Canine Health Information Center DNA Repository. The Repository stores samples to facilitate research on inherited disease in dogs. As of today, the PBGV Health & Rescue Foundation has 577 DNA samples in the bank. As a side issue, many years ago here vet Trevor Turner took blood from PBGVs at one of our shows. This was to be stored at the AHT. We later learned that vets are not allowed to take blood unless it is for a specific reason, when a sample from it may be separated for research purposes. At the National a seminar by Andreas Komáromy DVM, PhD covered canine eye diseases that are prevalent in all dog breeds. He then focused on primary open angle glaucoma (POAG). Dr Komáromy is testing a possible gene therapy for POAG, using Beagles that have a similar (but not identical) genetic mutation to that found in affected PBGVs. His results in Beagles so far are promising with the only adverse events being slight inflammation in a few of the treated eyes. He hopes to test the therapy in one or two affected PBGVs in the coming year.

THE WEATHER WAS SOMEWHAT TYPICAL FOR BATH - warm but with overcast sky and, later in the day, heavy drizzle set in. This show has earned a reputation for being one of the best for perfect conditions with good ground, ideal for dogs to make the most of the large, well mown rings and get into their full stride. A bonus this year was a welcome rotation of days, meaning that Hounds moved to Sunday instead of the bank holiday Monday. PBGVs were first in the ring at 9am with only one absent from Fred Ellingford's entry of 40. His DCC & BOB went to Robertson & Doherty's Ch Soletrader Magic Mike (Multi Ch Boom Chicago vTT Vriendjes ex Ch Soletrader Peek a Boo), with RDCC going to 2nd in Open, Teresa Eaton's Linphil Kili (Ch Debucher Unique ex Tangaer Zibeline avec Linphil). BCC was Blake & Reid's Ch Vilauddens Midsummer Magic (imp Swe) (Cookie Crunch vTT Vriendjes ex Vilauddens Saga) and. From Limit, RBCC went to Skerritt & Betts' Monkhams Luna Luvgood (Suton Crepu Visage Love From Roxy to Gemshorn (imp USA) ex Monkhams Kiwi). BP came from MPD with McCartney's Soletrader Freddie Mercury (Around Another Bad Hair Day ex Ch Soletrader Rita Ora) and BV went to Jane Brown's 9yr old Ch Soletrader Louis Vuitton. There was only one Special Beginner entered, Megan Crowe's Caldewriver Madame Hattie (Caldewriver Despicable Me ex Tangaer Ymarros). The Hound group was judged by Jenny Dove who awarded Magic Mike G3. In other classes judged by Mr C Hastings, Soletrader Freddie Mercury was placed 2nd in PD Stakes, Erin Robertson went 1st in JHA 6-11yrs handling Jane Brown's Soletrader Valentino Rossi and Charlotte Dalgarno placed 4th with Vencharno Mojito in YKC Members Stakes. At Carluke & DCS it was another Best Veteran Hound for Lorna & Steve Wyllie's Ch Tangaer Rhapsody at Callydena ShCM and at Cambuslang Canine Club BOB & HG3 went to Gail Foote & Erin McAulay's Erylan Hebe La Fille Jeune under Mrs K Herrington (Kathington). Kathy Moulding reminds everyone that this Sunday the Southern Day of the BGV takes place at Walberton Village Hall, West Sussex BN18 OPQ. Donations, prizes and sales items are taking over her living room. She said not so much space on her sofa now but just as well as she has no time to sit down at the moment. She is praying for a sunny day and plenty of visitors to take part in the fun events lined up to guarantee an enjoyable time. The day starts at 11am and for £5 your dog can enter all 10 fun classes which are to be judged by Jackie Hornby (Jacmist). Light refreshments will be available but bring your own picnic to enjoy at this popular venue which is at the heart of the village. The French Nationale d'Elevage takes place at Saint Georges d'Oleron on 9 June. The PBGV entry is 48 dogs and 50 bitches, totaling 98 and, over all breeds, there are 8 entries from the UK. PBGV dogs are being judged by Amand Simon and the bitches by Gerard Thomas. Interestingly, a compulsory eye examination certificate is required within two weeks for validation of the PBGV results.

WITH NO CCs, SOUTHERN COUNTIES saw an entry of 21, less 2, for Leila Tarabad. This is now one of those shows where, all to the good, the list of winners is getting longer and longer as it now includes a Best Junior and Best Special Beginners. It seems this latter class has replaced Good Citizen at many shows but it is somewhat of a mystery to many. There has been recent speculation in quite a few breeds that people are overqualified for entering. It's unclear, of course, whether they are deliberately flouting the qualification requirements for entry or just don't understand them as the definition "For owner, handler or exhibit not having won a Challenge Certificate or Reserve Challenge Certificate" is certainly open to interpretation. Maybe at some stage the KC will feel the need to BD / BOB went to Jane Brown's Soletrader Valentino Rossi with RBD to Phil & Dianne Reid's Maudaxi Oddjob. BB was Chris Blake's Orleans v Tum-Tums Vriendjes at Trezeguet (imp NLD), now a champion, and RBB Claire Cooper & Lynne Ellingford's Afterglow Agnes Gru avec Jayanel. BP was Lynne Scott's Soletrader Langham Rose for Overbecks, Best Junior Dalgarno's Legoland Amazine Grace (imp Rus), BV Jane Brown's Ch Soletrader Louis Vuitton and Best Special Beginners Moore's Afterglow Dough Ble Impact, who later went fourth in the Hound Special Beginners Group judged by Jacqui Ward. The constant breeze over the Club's Southern fun day at Walberton, West Sussex on Sunday 2 June was a godsend, keeping the temperature bearable for hounds and humans alike. There was an introduction to scenting hosted by Puppy School Chichester, Mad About Dogs agility, fun classes judged by Jackie Hornby, things to buy, eating, meeting old friends - both human and canine - and making new ones. WHAT A WEEK! Into June and the weather on the whole is pretty grim. The less I say about how wet we got at the Newmarket show, the better. Judging was indoors at Malvern for Three Counties where Michael MacLaren awarded BOB to his Best Bitch, Chris Blake's Orleans v Tum-Tum's Vriendjes at Trezeguet (imp NLD) who gained her third CC recently at Birmingham National. From Junior, Best Dog went to Linda Lewis' Tangaer Erique, the only dog entered. Reserve Best Bitch was second in OB, Linda Lewis' Tangaer Chamlee. It is such a shame that even a breed specialist could not bring forth the entries for this show which suffered from a combination of having lost CCs, it being on a weekday and clashing with the French National d'Elevage. At the Elevage in Saint-Georgesd'Oléron the PBGV judges were Simon Amand (dogs) and Thomas Gerard (bitches). BOB went to Gwen Huikeshoven's young Banana Crunch v Tum-Tum's Vriendjes (Cookie Crunch v Tum-Tum's Vriendjes ex Kiwi v Tum-Tum's Vriendjes). I awarded this PBGV Best Puppy Dog at Crufts in March. Both DCAC and RDCAC came from Working Males, the Dog CAC was Claude Jehanno's Mr Tango des Echos de Buzet (Durdur des Echos de Buzet ex Finette des Echos de Buzet), with Reserve DCAC Jopeau des Ronciers de la Brenne (Darko des Ptits Bouts de Chouans ex Gamin), owned and bred by Nicolas Marache. Bitch CAC from Open was Joesph Freuchet's Myrtille des Ptits Bouts de Chouans (Emir des Ptits Bouts de Chouans ex Capucine des Ptits Bouts de Chouans and RBCAC Frederic Marin's Mirabelle des Rosiers d'Anjou (Éclair des Rosiers d'Anjou ex Gala). There were several representatives entered from the UK, though I can't be certain of the results. Third place in Champion Males went to Phil and Dianne Reid's Ch Maudaxi Tommy Holedigger (Multi Ch/Am GCh Ch Soletrader Bjorn Borg ex Ir Ch Trezeguet Treacle Sponge at Maudaxi and, with the same mother, they gained a fourth place in Open Males with Maudaxi Nick Nack (sire Multi Ch Maudaxi Jimmy Choo); and Ceri McEwan was elated when her Marunnel Miss Adelaide (Vilauddens Isaak ex Ch Maudaxi Coco Chewnel from Marunnel) headed Intermediate Females. With no CCs and falling on a weekend day, there are respectable entries at the next two championship shows. At Border Union Jolanda Huisman from the Netherlands has 18 and at Blackpool the entry is 17 for Luis Pinto Teixeira (Portugal). It came as a shock to hear of the death late last week of Alan Curry, who judged PBGVs at our Club Championship Show last November. Alan first started showing Cocker Spaniels in 1976, they were followed by Dandie Dinmonts and then in 2002 a PBGV arrived. He gave CCs in five other breeds including PBGVs, which he first awarded at East of England in 2012. breed members eligible to apply for various AKC hunting titles for their PBGV such as Hunting Hound (HH). This will be after successfully passing a hunt test conducted by the Basset Hound Club of America. Guidelines and rules for the Hunting Instinct Test were approved by the PBGVCA Board of Directors as long ago as 2000 and since then they have held regular tests, including a separate event held in conjunction with the annual National and this latest move gives recognition to their efforts to preserve the inherent hunting instincts of the breed. The 2020 National will be at the Roberts Centre in Ohio. As usual there will be a hunt off-site and everything else held at the main venue. At meetings held at the National this year in Kerrville, Texas it was announced that Helen Ingher had been elected AKC Delegate, an important and influential role which is suitable for someone with her long experience in the breed. Helen reported that PBGVs now rank 157/193 in the low number breeds. On the health front Dr Komaromy continues to present valuable seminars, now on gene therapies. Blood draws are still paid for by the PBGVCA if they cannot be done during the National. For eye testing the Health Foundation will reimburse \$50 for any PBGV, 1 year or older, going to a Veterinary Ophthalmologist for examination. And for DNA testing, the PBGVCA Health Foundation recommends that owners use the AHT here in the UK because the American company does not cover PBGVs. All Club members were asked to check the accuracy of information recorded on their PBGVs and update it if necessary. One valuable piece of information that does not get passed on to the PBGVCA is where a PBGV is POAG Clear by parentage, therefore the PBGVCA asked owners to send results to them with a copy of the DNA certificate. Dr Komaromy suggested testing offspring of Clear parent to Clear parent. The PBGVCA currently recognises 2 generations of Clear by parentage. This is somewhat at a variance from the practice here. Hereditarily Clear/Clear by parentage is how the Kennel Club defines dogs whose parents have both been DNA tested Clear of a mutation, meaning they do not themselves need to be DNA tested. Currently this hereditary Clear status lasts forever, however it is possible the KC will be changing this soon so that a DNA test will need to be repeated once every three generations. With implications for our breed, we will be watching progress on this. Limited Odds Drawwinners for July are Diane Quadling with £15, £10 to Nik Oakley and £5 to Sue & Terry Cole. And what happened at East of England? Most exhibitors arrived dressed expecting hot weather but the skies clouded over, it was decidedly chilly with wind gusting through the tenting and it even rained! PBGVs were second it the ring after 54 Irish Wolfhounds so it was well after midday before getting in the ring. There were 2 absent from the 34 for judge Val Jackson. It was a good day for two exhibitors as both CCs went to Claire Cooper and both RCCs to Chris Blake. PBGV MISSING!We all dread the thought of ever losing our dog. Our heart sinks when we realise we don't know where he is. We don't know which way to look, as how do we know in which direction he has gone? This awful situation has happened to a family in Nuneaton who, last week on Wednesday 24 July, woke to find their 8mth old PBGV dog pup had disappeared from the house. A bad storm during the night resulted in a house door being wrenched open and Barney, bred by Jan Bishop, got out. The family had a little more information that most as he could be seen on their security camera for some time, trying to get back in but, with the door blowing open and shut, he was unsuccessful. One of the family's sons found him missing at 6.30am. The camera showed that just after 5am he was clipped by a car moving at slow speed on the A5 near The Longshoot A47 junction. He ran off. A recheck of the CCTV footage then showed that, immediately after this, a white van pulled up into a lay-by and hazard lights went on. Have searched thoroughly, including a drone being used to over nearby fields, this turned the family's thoughts to Barney being possibly stolen rather than lost. While efforts were being made to get the registration number of the van, last weekend the family reported Barney to the police as stolen and they now have a crime reference number. Enormous attempts have been made to trace Barney ranging from spreading the news on Facebook, alerting vets and shops and local volunteers have been out searching for him. His disappearance was announced on Fosse radio and there has been huge ongoing media coverage, including in the Nuneaton News. Of course, if he was taken, he could by now be many, many miles away. There has been ongoing support from DogLost and Nik Oakley has been an enormous help, also offering advice. to be trained as a therapy dog for one of the family's children, who has autism and, although buoyed by the support they have received from the community around them, they are not unnaturally devastated at not knowing what has happened to him. Please help to find Barney. If anyone has any information or dashcam footage, contact Nik on 0208 950 1440 or 07976 906273 or DogLost on 0844 800 3220 or 07973 899597. As far as I am aware, unfortunately technology has not yet reached the stage where trackers can be incorporated with microchips so, if your dog has been stolen, the first thing the person will do is remove the collar. Microchips don't work like GPS systems. They are tiny radio frequency identifying devices, roughly the size of a grain of rice. As we all know a microchip is implanted under your dog's skin and each chip carries a unique number. A scanning device can detect this number, which is then linked to your contact information on a pet recovery database. A tracker which is attached to your dog's collar works differently. GPS Trackers are cutting edge technology that allow you to pinpoint your dog's location in real time. You can see a history of where he has been on your device (usually an iphone). Generally depending on type of tracker and the greater the cost, some track further than others. Some attract a monthly subscription. Radio Trackers use a somewhat dated technology and have been used for decades. Maybe 35 years ago or more I looked into the only ones available at the time. They were used to track ferrets so range was not great. On a plus side, these devices don't need a monthly subscription. Nowadays Radio Trackers are commonly used by hunting dogs and cover roughly the same distance as a walkie talkie's range. To sum up, bear in mind that the more you spend the greater the range will be. But, if you decide to invest in a tracker, any type is only as good as when it is working, as batteries usually only last for 2-3 days until they run down. The weather wasn't too kind in the run-up to Leeds championship show resulting in quite a lot of comments about the state of the ground at Harewood Estate. Of course, hardworking committees cannot control the elements and most dog folk are a hardy bunch and tolerate most things and the show must go on. Now with CCs, this attracted a higher entry and PBGV judge Espen Engh had 37 to go over, depleted by 4. DCC went to Marion Hunt's Soletrader Buzz Aldrin at Bondlea, RCC to Jane Brown's Soletrader Valentino Rossi. BCC and BOB was Gavin & Sara Robertson's Soletrader Party in Paris, handled by Gavin, RCC Lynne Scott's Overbecks Kathy Tiere. BP went to Feasby's Caldewriver Wizard Of Oz at Torcarhian and Best Veteran, the only one entered, Jane Brown's Ch Soletrader Louis Vuitton. In other classes Erin Robertson achieved 3rd place in JHA 6-11 and, in JHA 12-16, Katie O'Brien came 3rd and Elizabeth O'Brien 4th. The judge was Robin Alner. After being missing for 10 days, hard to believe but he just walked in through the back gate, which had been left open in hope. I cannot begin to comprehend the elation the family must have felt to have him home safe and sound. Of course, they are unlikely to ever discover where he had been for the entire 10 long days but, after they got an indication he was in a field adjacent to the one at the back of their house, they tried to tempt him back home. The family put food out, placed his basket by the edge of a brook between the two fields and built a bridge over it. They also put one of their son's bedsheets down to lead him through the hedgerow to the field at the back of their house. This all helped him find his way to the back gate and into their garden. What a good boy! At the vets, with not enough flesh to make stitching viable, a decision was taken to let the few open wounds he had to his armpits heal on their own. He had 40 grass seeds removed from his paws, which are now being bathed daily in salt water to help ward off any potential infection. It goes without saying that this was such a stressful time for the family. They are so very grateful for all the help and advice they received and I somehow think all doors will be double checked in future. A salutary lesson for us all. At Paignton Championship Show, the loss of CCs and combined sexes resulted in an entry of 8, less 1 absent, for Suzanne Emrys-Jones. No more than an open show but at greater cost to the exhibitor. There were, in fact, only three exhibitors. Of course, when any of us enters a show, we have no idea what the total entry will be but certainly the breed is now poorly served at this show after having had CCs for so many years. There is now little incentive to enter. The stalwarts who travelled to Devon were rewarded with Best Dog going to Stuart & Joan Puckett's Soletrader Bobs Your Uncle, RBD and Best Puppy to the only puppy entered, Phil & Dianne Reid's Maudaxi Egg Nog Eddie. BD and BOB went to Gilluley's Ir Ch Haliston Didier ShCM ShCEX, BB to Cooper and Ellingford's Afterglow Agnes Gru avec Jayanel. Reserves were Feasby's Caldewriver Wizard of Oz at Torcharchian, who was also Best Special Beginner, and Wyllie's Tangaer Calvera avec Callydena. With BP going to O'Brien's Caldewriver Queen of Hearts, Wyllie's Ch Tangaer Rhapsody at Callydena ShCM took BV. In the YKC Members Stakes fourth place went to Charlotte Dalgarno with Vencharno Tequila Sunrise; and Lorna Wyllie's Ailsa (Ch Tangaer Rhapsody at Callydena ShCM) came in at third place in the Good Citizen Stakes. Both were judged by Sharon Pinkerton. And, under Elaine Tullis, Junior Handling (12-16) saw Katie O'Brien take 2nd place with Caldewriver Queen of Hearts. Some of you may have noticed there has been no recent update to the POAG DNA testing results issued regularly to us by the Animal Health Trust. Earlier in the year a change of staff at the Trust resulted in a request for me to provide a letter of authority for them to continue sending us the results. It seems that, despite the General Data Protection Regulation being introduced well over a year ago, the needed to cement the arrangement. In the past, the BGV Club received the stats monthly but, now that so many PBGVs have been DNA tested, and with some litters being Hereditary Clear, the numbers tested are obviously declining. However, it is good to continue publishing these stats, which serve to remind breeders and owners of the importance of DNA testing.

CH/IR CH TANGAER MAGIQUE has died. He was 16, having been born on 15 August 2003. Arguably the most successful PBGV ever bred by Linda Lewis, he went BOB at the BGVC championship shows in 2007 under Rose Phillips, entry 51, and again in 2010 under Colin Gillanders when the PBGV entry was 74. Mikey's sire was the well-known C'est Ça du Greffier du Roi at Tangaer, his dam Tangaer Hourra. Linda wrote "Even though he attained 15 CCs and 18 RCCs apart from other awards, these fade into insignificance as the bright light of loving that wonderful dog takes the foreground! Thank you, Mikey, from the bottom of my heart for being you, leaving some lovely progeny and getting me through some serious lows! Run free my darling boy." Brian Foster took centre stageat City of Birmingham, having no absentees from his entry of 30. DCC went to the only dog in Junior, Kyle Cadmore & Lizzie Greenslade-Cadmore's Soletrader Only in Oslo, who also went Best Junior. BCC and BOB to Sara Robertson & Wendy Doherty's Ch Soletrader Annie Mac who, returned from the States and 6yrs old, is now an American Grand Champion. Both Reserve CCs went to Chris Blake. Still awaiting the export pedigree so shown under her ATC number, the DCC was Huikeshoven & Mard's Vilauddens Magnificent Mile, BCC his and Dianne Reid's Ch Vilauddens Midsummer Madness. BP was Phil & Dianne Reid's Candy's Caning It, BV Jane Brown's Ch Solerader Louis Vuitton. With City of Birmingham being one of the championship shows that mounts a Junior in Group competition, Only in Oslo was placed first in the Hound Junior Group by judge Patsy Hollings, who only seven weeks ago awarded him the DCC at Houndshow. At shows in Guernsey, now 10 years old, Christine Marett's Limier Didier of Gayteckels (Ch Soletrader Peter Pan ex Limier Chamois) is still notching up the wins with a recent Reserve Veteran in Show and Best Veteran in Show. And, here, at South Eastern Hound, where the entry seems to go down every year, Jan Bishop's Jamar Ina The Countessa won herself into 4th place in the Special RBOB Competition judged by Diane Webber. Well, it had to happen, straight after letting you know there was a delay in the AHT sending out their latest figures for POAG DNA testing, I received the update, which is now on the club website www.bgvclub.co.uk/eyes, also on the Club facebook group page. Curiously, this time round, the new stats have elicited some comments, including the question whether DNA testing is compulsory. Whether or not to DNA test depends on several factors, one being the health status of the sire and dam and whether the litter is therefore Hereditary Clear. Our Club Code of Ethics doesn't make it compulsory to DNA test puppies from a Clear x Carrier breeding as, at the very worst, a pup will be a Carrier. However, care needs to be taken as in the future a Carrier pup could be bred from. Endorsements of any Clear x Carrier litter are the wise option then, before lifting an endorsement, the breeder can help ensure an outcome with pups free of future POAG eye problems. It does seem many are of the opinion that, in any event, it is the safe and conscientious thing to do to DNA test all puppies anyway. In my 12 July notes, I mentioned that the KC was thinking of changing the "for life" Hereditary Clear status to a requirement for DNA testing to be repeated once every three generations. Although an item on the agenda of their September Breed Health Symposium confirmed this, in a Press Release issued this week they now say "From January 2022, the Kennel Club will limit the assignment of 'Hereditary Clear' status of registered dogs to two generations. This change will be put in place to safeguard against the impact that dogs with an incorrect 'Hereditary Clear' status could have on health issues within a breed". With these current deliberations, it therefore remains to be seen how this will affect our breed in the future.

AT LONG LAST Richmond Championship Show heeded the voices of many and changed their tenting layout this year to in and out. No longer were the tents and benching a long way from the rings and it seems everyone was pleased with the new arrangement. A PBGV owner and judge, Audrey was a BGVC committee member for many years, standing down in 2008 when travelling long distances became rather too much for her. Despite losing her services as a committee member, Audrey continued to run the Limited Odds Draw, a task she finally handed over to Geraldine Dodd in 2013. Not long after, Audrey moved to Lytchett Matravers in Dorset to be near her family. I know I am getting a lot of emails that end up in my Junk folder these days, mostly on the lines of "Hello my dearest, I need your urgent reply" but occasionally something important gets routed there by mistake. For example, in the States dog pounds are now known as "shelters", occupants formally known as strays or mongrels are now classed as "adoptable rescues". In sharing their passion for breeding healthy dogs with predictable type, they felt that it was time that breeders did the same. Their message was that it was no longer good enough to say we are "purebred dog breeders" (as opposed to those who produce mixed breed dogs) but we should say our dogs are "purposefully bred pure breed". Moreover breeders are "preservationists" who intentionally bring these dogs into the world. In the days of declining PBGV numbers this would seem especially true where most breeders consciously aim to invest in a purposefully bred dog's future and, importantly, in the future of the breed. In our own way PBGV breeders are also helping to preserve our breed's temperament with its strong hunting instincts and mental and physical stamina to carry out its "purpose." Postal entries close next Monday 28 October, on-line Monday 4 November, the day after the BAD. This year we welcome judges from overseas with Renaud Buche from France for Grands and Paula Heikkinen-Lehkonen from Finland for Petits. BIS is Sue Virgo. And don't forget to enter the Stakes Classes were big money is on offer. GBGV judge is Mandy Dance, PBGV Jackie Hornby. We were pleased that one of the many open shows held at Maidstone in Kent put on classes for us and, having circumnavigated the closed roads to get there (including the closure of the approach road to the Dartford Crossing), at Gravesend & Medway Towns CS Open Show last Sunday our Beaujons Vagabond of Monkhams went BOB with RBOB going to his daughter, our Monkhams Memphis Belle. There was a good entry of 9 with 1 absent for our judge Peter Pask (Baronglen), so hopefully this will encourage other Kent canine societies to give us classes. Bond later went Hound G3 under Pat Pask, with Jan Bishop's Jamar Ina The Countessa winning the Hound Puppy Group. The draft Animal Welfare (Licensing of Animal Exhibits) (Wales) Regulations 2020 is still under review and subject to consultation. It has to be ensured that any new legislation is proportionate and reasonable and does not create an additional burden on dog owners where the animals are being kept primarily as pets that are shown as a hobby. Despite this the Welsh Government is determined to enforce their commitment to ensuring the highest welfare standards and want to demonstrate that they take the exhibition of animals seriously. Of course we all know that, for the vast majority, our loved dogs who are exhibited receive even better treatment than most. They are groomed, bathed, looked after carefully and kept in A1 condition. It is patently obvious they enjoy their time at a show and in the ring; and they are contented afterwards. My only personal observation would be that it concerns me when dogs are left unattended while owners go for a drink or something to eat. It is something I try to avoid at all costs and, under the spotlight of impending legislation, this could lead to criticism. The consultation period ends on 21 November and the KC strongly urges all with an interest in exhibiting dogs in Wales to answer the survey on https://gov.wales/animal-exhibits. Please make time to complete it!

WITH NO CCs AT MIDLAND COUNTIES it was, of course, a late appearance in the ring for PBGVs. Barbara Milton was the judge with 3 absent from her entry of 16. From the 5 dogs entered, BD came from the Puppy Dog class with the award going to Reid's Maudaxi Egg Nog Eddie and RBD to Bartley's Erylan Zeus Roi Des Dieux. From Open Bitch, BB and BOB went to Foote & McAulay's Erylan Hebe La Fille Jeune, RBB was Cooper & Ellingford's Afterglow Agnes Gru Avec Jayanel. BP Reid's Maudaxi Candy's Caning It. Paul Wilkinson was the Hound Breeders Stakes judge and, with just 3 entries, second place went to Foote & McAulay's Ir Ch Erylan Aphrodite La Belle. She went one better in Good Citizens gaining first place under Michael Forte. The weather caused some problems with flooded roads near Stafford Country Showground but dog folk are a hardy bunch and, as Martin Bishop, sagely said "I got Mrs B to walk in front of the car to see how deep the water was". I was extremely sorry to learn from Lorna Wyllie that her good friend, Anne McLennan, had lost her fight against cancer. In a tribute to her, Lorna writes: "Anne McLennan showed dogs for over 40 years, initially Afghans and then Dachshunds. When I first met over ten years ago she was showing her standard long-haired Dachshund Ziggy. One day Anne offered to handle our PBGV Bailey while I handled Belle. She was then always handling our PBGVs in open shows and some championship shows. Anne was a very well-known and respected exhibitor. Ziggy Anne as I called her and I buddied up to go to dog shows and we became very good friends. She gave me lots of help and advice when I started showing my first PBGV Ailsa. Sadly Anne passed away on Sunday after only 6 weeks from diagnosis of an aggressive form of cancer. She was a trustee of the Scottish Dachshund Club rescue. A true friend and will be sadly missed by many". The Club's Breed Appreciation Day takes place on Sunday at Corley Village Hall, near Coventry. Postal entries for our Club championship show on Saturday 23 November have now closed so, if not already entered, you need to get your skates on and go on-line to www.fossedata.co.uk. Entries close midnight 4 November. Following on from my comments a few weeks back about the emphasis in the States now being on breeding "purposefully bred pure breeds" and that breeders are "preservationists", I see the FCI is also placing the emphasis on "Preservation not commercialism" http://www.fci.be/en. A comparative international study of 100,000 pure-bred and cross-bred dogs related to their genetic status. Which Group is more affected with Genetic Failures?" LAST WEEK when I wrote about our Bond acting impeccably and being a good ambassador for the breed when visiting someone in a care home, little did I think that just a few days on I would be giving you the sad news that the lovely lady we visited had passed away. Diana Sadler was a hard-working BGVC committee member from 2005 to 2013. To say that she launched herself into everything would be an understatement. This included running the club shop and, latterly, taking on the daunting task of Welfare & Rescue Co-ordinator, a job she tackled most conscientiously for 6yrs, despite handling some difficult situations. And, seeing a need to get BGV folk together in the west of the UK, she even set up a Wales & West group with a small website to encourage and welcome local people. From Minsterworth to Weobley village halls, each event she mounted was well attended where the programmes for the day were always full, ranging from grooming demonstrations and tips, to games and fun classes, have a go agility, talks on hydrotherapy, homeopathy and acupuncture and silent auctions. Her ideas were boundless and these popular get-togethers attracted members not only from Wales and the West but from the far reaches of England. When Diana's final report was read out at the 2013 AGM, she was applauded as an unsung hero, one of the many committee members who do so much "behind the scenes" work for the love of their breed. Unfortunately in the last few years, Diana's health problems had prevented her from travelling far. Her last judging appointment, of which she was immensely proud, was to award CCs to PBGVs at the BGVC's 2016 championship show, But tragically it was an unexpected, aggressive cancer that was to claim her life. In recent weeks, she was moved from Herefordshire to be near one of her sons in Cambridgeshire. Instead of the letters I had been writing, this allowed me to visit her every week. On the first visit, I was accompanied by Diana's good friends Lynn Wood and Kim Culyer-Dawson; and Diana had very much on her mind the enjoyable times she had spent running events, competitions and raffles, all giving pleasure to those who owned dogs. It has been a stressful and sad time for Diana's two sons who are now in our thoughts. Her funeral takes place at 9:30am on Tuesday 19 November 2019 at Fenland Crematorium, Knights End Road, March, Cambridgeshire, PE15 0YJ. I can't help thinking Diana would be saying "Well, if you can get up early to go to a dog show!" At the end of next week, our 32nd club championship show takes place at Sports Connexion, Ryton-on-Dunsmore. This year we welcome judges from overseas. I now have a better breakdown of the entries. WE HAVE A CHANGE OF JUDGE for PBGVs at our Club Championship Show on Saturday. On Monday I received an email from Harri Lehkonen letting me know that his wife, Paula, had been in an accident in Tallinn, Estonia. She had hit her head quite badly and was in intensive care at a hospital there. Thankfully her condition is now stable but obviously there is no way she could be at our show, which she had been looking forward to. Since Harri's email, Paula has contacted me from the hospital saying she is so sorry she will not be able to judge for us. Phil Freer, who came second in the 2020 Championship Show judges' ballot, has kindly accepted being the emergency replacement judge and will be taking over Paula's excellent entry of 65 / 70. Our Chairman, Paul Osbourne, is unable to get to the show this year but has asked me to say he hopes you all have an enjoyable day. The show opens at 9am and, with the usual two rings in operation, judging of PBGVs starts at 10am. If any of you want to pay for either next year's LOD subscription or your 2020 club membership, I am sure Geraldine Dodd and Martin Bishop will be pleased to see you during the day. Similarly, 2020 Breeders Directory payments fall due shortly. You can find the application form at the bottom of this page on the club website www.bgvclub.co.uk/breeders. Money to me please. IT IS GRATIFYING that the BGVC committee has received so many congratulations after the 32nd championship show, which was held at Ryton on Dunsmore last Saturday. Just one said "I popped in briefly on Saturday and watched some of the judging and thoroughly enjoyed your championship show. It all seemed so calm and running smoothly. Having run both all breed open shows and breed club champ shows I know the work involved prior to make that happen". Lots of planning and work over the year before ensures getting the show on the road, as does working together on the day. With no prior warning that we would be in the rear half of the Cricket Hall, getting matting, mats, ring fencing and posts, raffle prizes and shop items into the hall was made rather more difficult. However, thanks to all the hard work, of both committee and stewards, the show went seamlessly. One special mention goes to Sue Marshall, our photographer, who as usual sacrificed seeing much of the show as she was kept busy in her photographic area taking photos of all the 1st and main winners. These are in the club's Winter Voice, which is going to print this week. They will also be on the club website shortly. The show was opened by Vice Chairman Peter Marks, who held a minute's silence for former committee members, Audrey Herring and Diana Sadler, who had died during the year. And, as our show took place, the nominated PBGV judge Paula Heikkinen-Lehkonen from Finland was still in hospital in Tallinn, Estonia. Good wishes had been sent for her speedy recovery from an accident which resulted in her hitting her head. Phil Freer, who had kindly stepped in as replacement judge at very short notice, said he really enjoyed his day. There were 5 absent from his entry of 65 and his CC winners were both Soletrader breeding, with the DCC and BOB going to Gemma McCartney's Soletrader Freddie Mercury and BCC to Gavin & Sara Robertson's Soletrader Judigarland. This was her third CC so a special thrill for handler Erin Robertson. Reserves went to Kyle & Lizzie Cadmore's Ch Soletrader Only In Oslo and Soletrader Dancing In Deli. From MPD, BP was Joan Hutchings' Tangaer French Romance and BV was our Ch Beaujons Ugly Betty of Monkhams JW ShCM. It was good to see many visitors to the show – those keen to get a BGV puppy, those who already have one and came to look round, those who wandered in from the Nordic Show in the adjacent hall. One person who also deserves a mention is Tracey Mayou, back from living in Spain, where I last saw her at the Granada show in 2012. Her Nykarth bitch, now 9yrs old, was looking good! HARD TO BELIEVE we are now into the final month of the year. LKA is approaching fast with a good entry of 40 for PBGV judge Linda Lewis. However, I have been hearing of quite a few dogs with kennel cough so fear some entries will be decimated. Bear in mind that we all declare we will not bring to a show any dog which has contracted or been knowingly exposed to any infectious or contagious disease during the 21 days prior to the show. Kennel cough, or Bordetella, can usually go away on its own – most cases will clear up within three weeks and shouldn't need any treatment at all. For treating at home garlic is a great addition to your dog's diet, as is organic unrefined / virgin coconut oil which possesses amazing immune-enhancing properties. And raw honey is a great natural treatment that helps soothe the throat. If you have a young pup, older dog or one that is unwell with a weakened resistance, you may need a visit to the vet for antibiotics to target the bacteria. However remember to stay outside the waiting room until called. This is very contagious; it spreads in the air, by contact with infected dogs and in the environment. Two weeks on from our recent club championship show and our PBGV judge-elect, Paula Heikkinen-Lehkonen, who withdrew after suffering concussion and skull fractures in an accident in Estonia, is now back in Finland and in hospital in Lahti. It seems that teddy bears arriving there are helping her recovery. Yesterday I received a phone call from a lady who had just lost her old PBGV. He died two days short of his 17th birthday, a wonderfully long life and surely some sort of record. His name was Tanafei Kaviar, bred by Carol & John Symonds. The litter will be remembered of course for Kaviar's brother, Kipling, who went to Lesley Cooper. There he sired two litters, the first when mated to her Monkhams Elise. Into the new year and on-line entries for Boston, where Ceri McEwan is judging PBGVs, have been extended to closing on 8 December. Although a championship show, it is a pity that only two of the 19 scheduled Hound breeds receive CCs. Those for Manchester close on 11 December. Fran Mitchell is the PBGV judge, giving CCs for the first time. And, with the flurry of activity surround Christmas, don't forget that postal entries for Crufts close on 6 January, on-line 20 January. Entry fee per dog is now £31. We have an expensive hobby!

Bear in mind that, if in joint ownership, each owner must be a club member to be able to claim a trophy. You may remember the article I wrote in the Summer Voice about PBGV Fleur, who was bred in a hunt kennels and, as such, was never KC registered at the time. The best owner Barbara Kettleborough was able to do was register her on the KC's Activity Register. However, due to Barbara's perseverance, the long process of getting Fleur accepted onto the KC's breed register has been worthwhile. She has now received the good news that, with the remaining elements accepted to support her Unverified Dog Scheme application, all is now in order to progress to registration. Thanks to Geraldine Dodd for letting me know that December's winners of the Limited Odds Draw are Sue Brundle with £15, Kim Smith £10 and Alison Cocks £5. Good luck to everyone travelling to the NEC for LKA. The gods have not been kind to us in this household as three of our PBGVs have kennel cough, so I have kissed goodbye to over £113.

20 / 12 / 2019

CONGRATULATIONS TO GEMMA MCCARTNEY whose young Soletrader Freddie Mercury gained his third CC at LKA at just 14mths old. He also went BOB, with the BCC going to Sara, Oliver & Erin Robertson's Soletrader Vocal in Venice, handled by Gavin Robertson. Reserves went to Jane Brown's Soletrader Valentino Rossi and Ceri McEwan's Marunnel Miss Adelaide. BP was Phil & Dianne Reid's Maudaxi Candy's Caning It and BV, the only one present, Jane Brown's Ch Soletrader Louis Vuitton. There were 10 absent from the entry of 40 for judge Linda Lewis. Bemoaning our fate, we reluctantly stayed away from Saturday's LKA having had three dogs suffer from kennel cough. Despite them all being well over it, we adhered by the declaration that we undertake not to bring to the show any dog which has contracted or been knowingly exposed to any infectious or contagious disease during the 21 days prior to the day of the Show. Just as well as PBGV number four started coughing on Sunday. This does rather highlight that, even though exhibitors may think their dog is over the kennel cough, it is highly contagious and bringing a dog into an area where it can infect others is not the wisest move! selfish. Meanwhile the biggest dog show in America, the only one organised by the American Kennel Club, has just taken place. The National Championship in Orlando, Florida, ran over two days and was the finale of a week-long circuit of all breed and specialty shows. Donna Bruce, Juli Lacey-Black & Jill Neuschaefer's Monkey, GHCS/ Am Ch Lacey's Not My Circus (Am Ch Fanta's Brand N Lacey's Nuff Said ex Am Ch Lacey's Sweet Annie) had a successful time going BOB, Best Bred By and Bred By Group 4. BOS was Patty Opperman, Jan Zigich, B Tezel & Ross Litman's Mirepoix's Kate Spade (GCH/Am Ch Mirepoix's Son Of A Duck ex Am Ch Clementine's A Touch Of Prada of M&M). The judge was Dr Donald Sturz Jr. This followed on from Monkey's BOB at the PBGVCA specialty judged by Barbara Pepper. Unusually, this year's Amsterdam Winner Show is being held the weekend before Christmas on Saturday 21 and Sunday 22 December, in a joint venture with Nijmegen KC. And there is a change of location with it being held at the Eventhall Gorinchem. This Christmas Show will be a pilot for evaluation afterwards, to see if this new organisation structure has lived up to expectations. I have received the news that Sylvia Probert (Kasani) died peacefully on Tuesday following an illness. I am sure my co-author, who was a good friend of Sylvia's, will forgive me for lifting an extract from our PBGV book: "The friendly breed enchanted Sylvia Probert at the 1980 East of England Championship Show, Peterborough and her three foundation bitches (Wakelyns Annette, Vendric Vanessa and Jomil Revelry) soon attracted others, notably Mrs Cynthia Mair and John and Adele Walton-Haddon, who had litter-mates Kasani Clochard and Charité, born March 21 1983 (Jomil Larbi of Varon - Vendric Vanessa of Kasani). A mating between Jomil Rigolo and Wakelyns Annette of Kasani produced on August 20 1983 the "D" litter, including Sylvia's Dramatique; then the following year Vanessa produced a litter by Varon Zorro, having gone BIS at Luton Show that March. In 1985 Sylvia became Acting Club Secretary when Richard Gilbert's professional commitments prevented him from continuing. She became Secretary in 1986. Being keen to improve her own stock and increase the small gene pool in the country, Sylvia imported Salto's half-sister, Ristourne de Crislaure (Noiro de l'Égalité - Nanouche de Crislaure), in whelp to Dan Ch Ursins des Rives de la Garonne. From the resulting litter, born in quarantine on November 20 1984, Gaffeur went to Audrey Benbow's Sirhan kennels in Canada and Gamin to Colin and Dianne Poole (Peterstown). Sylvia kept two - Galaxie who, by December 1988, was a champion and Gambit, who earned two CCs and became an influential stud in his short life, siring Champions Kasani Karelia and Korister, born October 10 1987 (- Twinrivers Hortense of Kasani). In 1988 litter brother Kraftsman joined Valerie Link in the States. In 1987 Sylvia's other import, Chouan Katzenjammer Kid of Kasani, born May 2 1986 (Dan Ch Chouan Hen's Dream - Dan Ch Morebess Nadia de Cahors), arrived from Danish breeders Gunnar Nymann and Holger Busk. Shown sparingly, in July 1989 she passed to Nicky Hunt and subsequently had two litters. Whilst living in Gloucestershire, Sylvia supported the hunt and her own Rabbit Trapper of Kasani (Chantalle's Officer - Future Amnesty) joined Nick Valentine's pack for a while. Subsequent ill health forced her to temporarily withdraw from breeding and showing but, thanks to Helen Bamforth who took on her Kasani stock, the line has continued. Improved health came with a move to Surrey in 1996, with Sylvia renewing her lively interest in the breed and, in 1998, being voted back on the Committee". Sylvia returned to the BGV Club committee in 1998 and, in 2002, became Acting Chair on the death of Evan Roberts. She assumed the post of Chair for 2003-04. During this time, rather unusually she also covered the post of Secretary when Yvonne Dean became ill. Sylvia subsequently became a Vice-President, a position she relinquished in 2009.
